St. Joseph, the Obedient Father

(A reflection on the Virtue of Obedience in the Year of St. Joseph)

The year 2021 has been declared by the Holy Father as the Year dedicated to St. Joseph. Pope Francis made this declaration through his apostolic letter, Patris Corde. Patris Corde means 'with a father's heart'. What a beautiful way of entitling an apostolic letter in honor of a great father, St. Joseph. The Holy Father announces with clarity the purpose of "the year of St. Joseph" in these words: "The aim of this Apostolic Letter is to increase our love for this great saint, to encourage us to implore his intercession and to imitate his virtues and his zeal" (Patris Corde No.7). In this letter the Holy Father presents St. Joseph as a 'Father' and qualifies him with a number characteristics that are predominant in St. Joseph as a 'father'. He calls him, a beloved father, a tender and loving father, Obedient Father, an accepting father, a creatively courageous father, a working father and a father in the shadows. Pope Francis beautifully elucidates these attributes beautifully well in simple terms. It is not my intention to repeat them here. I intend to share the result of my own personal reflection on just one of these attributes, i.e. the "obedient father"

1. St. Joseph - less speech and more obedience

"Joseph did as the angel of the Lord commanded him and took his wife" (cf. Mt 1:24). Obedience is key to the strength of the edifice of the Church. Obedience has been the thread that keeps the Church united and strong. The story of the fall of humanity begins with the disobedience of Adam and Eve. The story of salvation begins with obedience of Jesus, St. Joseph and Mary. And there followed a series of acts in obedience by the apostles, first disciples martyrs, saints and those innumerable number of believers who were all made to participate in the writing of the history of salvation. St. Joseph is a key figure in this story, though often, a neglected character. We don't have any word in the Sacred Scripture as pronounced by St. Joseph. He is silent. But his actions spoke louder than words - acts of obedience. St. Joseph was a true man. He did exactly what the Lord asked of him every time and without delay. He lived the fourth commandment to the letter. He is a model of obedience that we should all aspire to follow more closely. Let us look at the various dimensions of his obedience in the following few paragraphs.

2. Obedience of Joseph finding expression in being merciful justice

Like any other Jew Joseph vowed obedience to the Law but this obedience was, unlike that of the Pharisees, not devoid of mercy and justice towards other humans. But Joseph, her husband, being a righteous man, and unwilling to expose her publicly, purposed to have put her away secretly; (Mat 1.19). Joseph was careful, while following the law, not to hurt the sentiments of another person. He was concerned about the possible nightmare into which Mary, his betrothed woman, would have fallen. He wants to save her from that ordeal. How often has a person's compulsive extremity to follow the dictates of the law, caused pain, humiliation and even destruction another person's life and purpose? How can we justify such a destructive rigidity which earns nothing in the end? An act of obedience, to be interpreted as a virtue, should be associated with merciful justice in the example of St. Joseph.

3. Obedience of Joseph is accompanied by a sense of responsibility

St. Joseph was a just man and when he was acting according to the will of God revealed through the angel, he was teaching us how to practice a responsible obedience. By undertaking to obey the authority of God man cannot be irresponsible for his acts. Because a person choose to obey in freedom and responsibility. I cannot escape the responsibility of the fruits of my action because I was asked to do so. I cannot transfer the whole responsibility to the one whom I have chosen to obey. I wholeheartedly participate in the whole project grasping in as much as I can the intention and motive of the act. Joseph obeyed with responsibility. That is why he didn't need to be guided moment by moment in what has to be done to protect and care for the divine child and His Mother. Pope Francis writes about this quality of St. Joseph in these words and counsels the believer: Joseph is certainly not passively resigned, but courageously and firmly proactive. In our own lives, acceptance and welcome can be an expression of the Holy Spirit's gift of fortitude. Only the Lord can give us the strength needed to accept life as it is, with all its contradictions, frustrations and disappointments. (Patris Corde, No. 4)

4. Obedience of Joseph was marked with a caring love

The virtue of obedience is made visible in his acts of care and protection of the Holy family of Nazareth. Pope Leo XIII wrote: The special motives for which St. Joseph has been proclaimed Patron of the Church and from which the Church looks for singular benefit from his patronage and protection, are that Joseph was the spouse of Mary and that he was reputed the Father of Jesus Christ. From these sources have sprung his dignity, his holiness, his glory. (Quamquam Pluries, Encyclical of Pope Leo XIII on Devotion to St. Joseph, No. 3) The Pope continues to explain how this two-fold dignity finds demonstration in how he enacted this responsibility in obedience. From this two-fold dignity flowed the obligation which nature lays upon the head of families, so that Joseph became the guardian, the administrator, and the legal defender of the divine house whose chief he was. And during the whole course of his life he fulfilled those charges and those duties. He set himself to protect with a mighty love and a daily solicitude his spouse and the Divine Infant: regularly by his work he earned what was necessary for the one and the other for nourishment and clothing, he guarded from death the Child threatened by a monarch's jealousy, and found for Him a refuge; in the miseries of the journey and in the bitternesses of exile he was ever the companion, the assistance, and the upholder of the Virgin and of Jesus. (Quamquam Pluries, Encyclical of Pope Leo XIII on Devotion to St. Joseph, No. 3)

5. Obedience of Joseph was marked with trust in the authority (of God)

Another characteristic of the virtue of Josephine Obedience was trust in the authority he was obeying. Joseph obeyed God. He knew that God cannot go wrong. He knows that the struggles in following his orders are short-lived and that finally the purpose will be served. God is a faithful authority and it is easy to obey Him because we can trust him. The trustworthiness and faithfulness of the authority in question is of primary importance in inducing a subject to obey. Every act of obedience is founded on the basis of mutual trust. Trustworthiness from the part of the person in authority and loyalty from the part of the subject who obeys.

6. The Obedience of Joseph was characterized by consistency

In every situation, Joseph declared his own "fiat", like those of Mary at the Annunciation and Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane, writes Pope Francis. (Patris Corde No. 3) For Joseph, Obedience was a fundamental option, an option that he made for the entire life, a lifelong commitment. The journey in obedience was not an easy one. He knew that he would and he in fact he faced struggles and hardships. In all these moments of darkness, obedience to the Word of God was the guiding light. Pope Francis continues, Often in life, things happen whose meaning we do not understand. Our first reaction is frequently one of disappointment and rebellion. Joseph set aside his own ideas in order to accept the course of events and, mysterious as they seemed, to embrace them, take responsibility for them and make them part of his own history. Unless we are reconciled with our own history, we will be unable to take a single step forward, for we will always remain hostage to our expectations and the disappointments that follow. (Patris Corde, No. 4)

7. Obedience of Joseph was marked with sacrifice

We have read in the Sacred Scripture, "Has the LORD as great delight in burnt offerings and sacrifices, as in obeying the voice of the LORD? Behold, to obey is better than sacrifice, and to listen than the fat of rams. For rebellion is as the sin of divination, and presumption is as iniquity and idolatry". (1 Samuel 15:22-23). But for St. Joseph Obedience was not better than sacrifice, but it was sacrifice. There's is no obedience without sacrifice. We sacrifice the desires of our own ego, we sacrifice our cravings after power, fame, comfort and personal satisfaction. St. Joseph sacrificed, in obedience, his own dreams and plans, his comforts and conveniences, his own security and life. As Soren Kierkegaard writes,

The proverb says: He laughs best who laughs last; but truly he also conquers best who conquers last, therefore not the one who conquers by putting to death-uncertain victory! but he who conquers by being put to death-O eternal, certain victory! And this sacrifice, the sacrifice of obedience-wherefore God looks, well pleased, upon the obedient one who brings himself as a sacrifice, while he heaps wrath upon the disobedience that puts the sacrifice to death-this sacrifice, this victor, is the martyr, for truly not everyone who is put to death is a martyr. (SOREN KIERKEGAARD, The Book on Adler, Princeton University Press, New Jersey, 2009, p. 234).

Conclusion

Speaking about plan to declare the Year of St. Joseph Pope Francis thanks all those who have in one or other way made sacrifices during this time of the pandemic and I cannot resist myself from the temptation of quoting those words from Patris Corde: My desire to do so increased during these months of pandemic, when we experienced, amid the crisis, how "our lives are woven together and sustained by ordinary people, people often overlooked. People who do not appear in newspaper and magazine headlines, or on the latest television show, yet in these very days are surely shaping the decisive events of our history. Doctors, nurses, storekeepers and supermarket workers, cleaning personnel, caregivers, transport workers, men and women working to provide essential services and public safety, volunteers, priests, men and women religious and so very many others. They understood that no one is saved alone... How many people daily exercise patience and offer hope, taking care to spread not panic, but shared responsibility. How many fathers, mothers, grandparents and teachers are showing our children, in small everyday ways, how to accept and deal with a crisis by adjusting their routines, looking ahead and encouraging the practice of prayer. How many are praying, making sacrifices and interceding for the good of all". Each of us can discover in Joseph - the man who goes unnoticed, a daily, discreet and hidden presence - an intercessor, a support and a guide in times of trouble. Saint Joseph reminds us that those who appear hidden or in the shadows can play an incomparable role in the history of salvation. A word of recognition and of gratitude is due to them all. (Patris Corde, Introduction)

Obedience is no longer a fashionable virtue. In The Book on Adler, Soren Kierkegaard observed that "the misfortune of our age - in the political as well as in the religious sphere, and in all things - is disobedience, unwillingness to obey." Its cause is not "doubt...but insubordination," which can assume two forms: "wishing to cast down the ruler [or authority] or wishing to be the ruler [or authority]." "The question is" really "quite simple," however: "Will you obey? Or will you not obey? Will you bow in faith before divine authority? Or will you be offended?" (SOREN KIERKEGAARD, The Book on Adler, Princeton University Press, New Jersey, 2009, p. 5) What Kierkegaard found to be true in the middle of the nineteenth century remains true today. And St. Joseph stands tall as an example and inspiration.

Christmas Carol




Christmas is one of the most important days of the Church year. It is the celebration of Christ coming among us.



I've always believed that the power of a person's life is the legacy they leave behind. Today, he is undoubtedly acclaimed as one of the greatest missionaries whose strenuous efforts, self-effacing services and undaunted spirit of determination laid a solid foundation for the Missionary zeal of Malabar Province, actualized into Malabar Carmelite mission which grew to OCD Delhi Province.

Rev. Fr. Martin was born of Mathai and Anna Panamthanam on 14thMay 1934 and was raised at Nellimattom in the diocese of Kothamangalam. In 1952, shortly after his matriculation he entered the Discalced Carmelite's Malabar Province as an aspirant. Completing his postulancy years in 1954, he was admitted to the Novitiate at St. Elias Monastery at Thakkalai, and under Rev. Fr. Eliseus Malamackal, he made his simple profession on 01 May 1955.



His academic qualifications attest to his intellectual calibre. Fr. Martin completed his scholastic studies at Ghent, Belgium, and theological studies at Haasrob faculty for Theology and he was conferred priestly ordination on 30 June 1962 at Courtrai. Prior to his doctoral studies in Rome, he served his Mother Province - Malabar, as procurator and as faculty member of Theology college, till he was sent for the pastoral Course at Pune. He successfully completed his doctorate in Canon law in 1976 from the Pontifical Gregorian University, Rome.

He diligently fulfilled all the duties and responsibilities entrusted to him with great passion for the Church and devotion to our blessed Mother. He was Asst. Director as well as the Director of AVP (1976-78), Provincial councillor (1978), Rector of CTC - Bengaluru (1981), and the Provincial of Malabar Province (1996-98). In his tenure as Provincial of Malabar he furthered the Orientalization of Malabar Province. In tune with the spirit of the General chapter at Lisieux – 1997, in which he participated, he updated the Ratio Institutionis. During his years in the office, he conceived and realized the Lisieux Center at Muvattupuzha along with the Common Cemetery, new land and foundation at Mandapam.

The commencement of the Malabar Carmelite Mission (1979) in the diocese of Jalandhar was propelled by the resources of Rev Fr. Martin as Mission Superior from 1984-87; 1992-93 and as the Regional Vicar from 1994 to 96, and as Commissariat Councillor from 2005 to 2008. He laudably carried out all the duties entrusted to him. He served the mission as the Superior of our monasteries at Hoshiarpur, Una and Muradnagar, and as the Director of Mount Carmel Schools at the aforesaid places as well as at Garhshankar.





In its essential growth, OCD Delhi Province is indebted to none other than the efficacious leadership, timely guidance and generous resources of Rev Fr. Martin. In the words of Rev Fr. Benjamin Kokkat OCD, "A committed and exemplary life is seen in him. A commitment to the Carmelite Order and its prayer life are manifested in his apostolate – contemplandis aliis tradere".

As an accomplished retreat preacher, he guided many congregations and had been once the CRI president in the Jalandhar Diocese. He selflessly assisted a new religious congregation (Little Sisters of Jesus Christ) which was

founded in 1984 by his younger Sister Nirmala in the diocese of Eluru, Andra Pradesh. Sr. Mariananda, the Present Superior General acknowledges his service in these words. "Fr. Martin was a great support to her (Sr. Nirmala) in her life's Journey as a religious sister and as a whole he was guiding star for our First Sisters in the initial years when Mother Nirmala started our congregation" (Sr. Mariananda LSJC, Letter Dated 8th March, 2021).

In the year 2008, Fr. Martin underwent an unsuccessful brain surgery at Christian Medical College, Ludhiana. Unimaginable patience and calmness could be seen as he We, the members of Delhi Province would like to place on record just in two words all that you have been to us: THANK YOU Dear REV FR. MARTIN. We are reminded that the life, legacy and the irreplaceable traces of influence that you have left behind would resound as those of Paul, the Apostle: "If we live, we live for the Lord, and if we die, we die for the Lord. Therefore, whether we live or die, we belong to God* (Rm 14:8).

gracefully faced 12 years of continued suffering even as his memory was fading. Although death is not the opposite of life but a part of it, it can be particularly painful when a loved one, who commendably contributed to the transformation of every area of the society, dies. Fr. Ambrose (Joseph) was born of Joseph and Aley in the family of Panackal on 4th November 1928 at Pathathala, Pala. He belonged to Meenechil Parish also known as Champakala in the Diocese of Pala. After his schooling he taught for some time in a primary school in Meenechil.

He joined the Carmelite Order in 1948 at Trivandrum, He did his Latin course for one year and entered the novitiate at St. Elias Monastery 1949. Fr. Andrew Fernandez was his Novice Master.

He made his first commitment on August 15, 1950 and his Solemn Profession was on August 15, 1953. His Philosophical studies were at Carmel Hill, Trivandrum and the first year of theology also he did at this same college.

At the end of 1956 he was sent to Ghent Belgium to complete his theology course. He was ordained priest at Ghent on August 18, 1957. After his priestly studies he was sent to Rome for Diploma Course in the institute of spirituality of the Carmelite Order. He was in the first batch. After the spirituality course he went to the desert house (hermitage) at Requebrune in France to put into practice what he had learned in the Institute of Spirituality.

In 1960 he returned from Europe and had his First Mass sung in his parish in 1960. He started a committed and dedicated service in the vineyard of the Lord for 52 years, until his last breath.

In different capacities he served the Malabar Province and proclaimed the Word of the Lord:

- Procurator in St. Elias Monastery Thuckaly
- Superior and Parish Priest at St. Joseph's Monastery, Varapoly
- Procurator at Carmel Ashram, Thachavur
- Director of the aspirants at St. Teresa's Monastery, Ernakulam
- Procurator at Carmelaram Theology College, Bangalore

In the Mission: Fr. Ambrose had listened to the call of God for the Missions in 1976 as a pioneer for the opening of the mission door to the Malabar Province which had a long-cherished urge inherited from its Founding Fathers, for radiating the Spirit of Carmel from Kanniyakumari to the Himalayas, Accordingly, Fr. Ambrose was sent as a pioneer missionary to Jalandhar together with Fr. Bernard in 1976. They got mission experience at different Stations in the Jalandhar Diocese.

After spending some time at Prem Ashram, Una for learning language he was sent to Ferezopur as Assistant Parish Priest. In the Provincial Chapter of 1978, Fr. Ambrose presented a good report of their mission experience and the possibilities of mission work in Punjab. And the Chapter welcomed it wholeheartedly and entrusted the task to do the needful. Accordingly, the door to the mission land got opened when the entered into an Agreement with the Bishop of Jalandhar Diocese by which he officially Area of the Diocese to us for our Mission work and development, in 1979. Then he served as In-charge directors, Chaplains: Yol Camp, Hoshiarpur (Superior), Una (Superior), Mehtiana and Khanaura, Baijanath, Palampur and Nangal and finally as superior of the House at St. Therese's Monastery, Dehradun. Fr. Ambrose was always helpful for the ansion of our mission activities especially for the opening of New Stations. He being a Senior Priest with impressive personality, was helpful in negotiations and dealings in the purchase of properties. He was the founder of many stations -Mehtiana, Baijnath, Palmpur and Muradnagar. His impact was in almost all the stations except two or three in our Delhi Province. He was actively involved for the growth and development of the Carmelite Mission. In the Diocese he was the regular confessor of the Major Seminary and many of the religious Houses. He strived to be one with all types of people - Omnia omnibus. Fr. Ambrose remained strongly committed to his duties and was

always joyful and happy, working in the Malabar Carmelite Mission and

Fr. Francis had a brilliant career throughout his life. He was vocation promoter, Rector of the Regional Major Seminary at Jalandhar, Principal at Una (1992-1993) and at Hoshiarpur (1993-1996), Novice Master (1996-1999), twice Regional Vicar(1999-2002, 2003-2004) and finally the first Commissary General, bringing our Regional Vicariate to the status of General Commissariate, an independent unit of the Order. During his tenure as Regional Vicar, the Novitiate House was built at Dehradun, land was purchased for Philosophy College at Faridabad, aspirancy house was built at Ollur and old age home was constructed at Nandachaur.



Francis, doctors found him critically ill, and therefore, he was admitted in St. Stephen's Hospital on 23rd January 2005. He had acute respiratory distress syndrome and was supported by ventilator until his death. His diagnoses showed that he was suffering from diabetics with septicaemia. On 27th January at 5:45 pm the Lord called him to his eternal rest.

His body was brought to Hoshiarpur on 28th and Holy Mass was offered for the repose of his soul by Rt. Rev. Dr. Peter Celestine, Bishop of Jammu Kashmir and then it was taken to the mortuary of the Sacred Heart Hospital, Maqsudan. On 2nd February his funeral services began with Holy Mass officiated by Rt. Rev. Dr. Symporian Keeprath OFM, Cap, Bishop of Jalandhar and Rt. Rev. Dr. Peter Celestine, Bishop of Jammu Kashmir, Rev. Fr. Fr. Joseph Nedumpurath was born at Arikuzha in the diocese of Kothamangalam on 23rd June 1948. After his school education and after serving as school teacher for some time he joined the Carmelite order and made his

first profession on 24th April 1971 and solemn profession on 6th June 1976. After completing his philosophical and theological formation he was ordained priest on 18th May 1980. After his ordination he was assigned with various responsibilities in the province such as Director of postulants, Master of students at Philosophy College, Supervisor of Carmel Nivas, Ranchi and Regional Vicar of St. Theresa's Regional vicariate, Punjab.

Because of his knowledge of Hindi language and aptitude for mission he was the first choice when the expansion of Carmelite life in Bihar was thought of. As a pioneer missionary he was the founder of our presence in Ranchi and for many years he continued to be in charge of the House in Ranchi. Later he was transferred to St. Theresa's Regional Vicariate. In 2002 he was elected as the Regional Vicar of St. Theresa Regional Vicariate.

I met Fr. Joseph Nedumpurath on 12th January 1989 for the first ime, when I reached Ranchi to begin my regency. I spend only six months there as a regent. During my regency time Fr. Joseph Nedumpurath instructed me more by his life example than by words. Both in summer and winter he used to get up early in the morning and spent at least one hour in the Chapel to make the mental prayer. Sometimes he used to reach very late in the night (Due to the paper work of the Land purchase), still he used to make the meditation before going to bed. Really I found a joyful Carmelite in Fr. Joseph Nedumpurath.

Fr. Joseph Nedumpurath was an ordinary, but exemplary religious with extra-ordinary quality of simplicity and availability. Unassuming, undemanding, he was happy and content with minimum. A man of prayer and deep spiritually he was very heroic and exemplary in his prayer life combined with missionary zeal. He lived with a pure and clean conscience, always ready to meet the Lord. Now he is enjoying the heavenly bliss with our lady the Queen of Carmel, Angels and Saints.

LOOSE LIPS SINK SHIPS

The phrase "loose lips sink ships" was a slogan during World War-II as part of the US office of war information's attempt to limit the possibility of people inadvertently giving useful information to enemy spies. Though this catchphrase was a wartime expression, we know and experience that loose or unguarded lips can sink more than sea going naval ships. They can sink friendships, relationships, companionship, partnership, leadership, kinship, fellowship and even our worship.

The fastest spreading six letter word in modern times is gossip. It's a spark that starts countless relational fires every day. Everyone battles with gossip. It's everywhere. It flows from our mouths. It's on Facebook. One finds it an Twitter. One sees it on the magazine covers. Movies and TV shows celebrate it. One may say that it's near impossible to live a life resisting gossip! A gossiping mouth is much like spatter-barrel shotguns. When used as weapons, they can successfully hit multiple targets at a great distance. That's why Pope Francis warns of the 'terror of gossip'. "When the temptation to gossip arises, bite your tongue. You might harm your tongue, but you won't harm your brother or sister', said Pope to the religious brothers and sisters on his visit to Bangladesh on 2nd December 2017.


The genealogy of gossip can be traced within the human brain. As it is said, we are all "meaning making machines". We have a natural tendency to assign meaning, whether good or bad, to every experience we come across. Our fantasy has the capacity to paint beautiful or ugly pictures in our minds and give an emotional surge occording to what we see from within.

What a lot of folks do is they take all that is brewed in their imaginations, tie it up with a bow and shoot it at the ears of someone else. Now the victim has no idea how you took and made distorted meanings and how you have coloured and tainted his perceptions and electrified his emotions. Now both are partners in this madness.

Loose lips often have demoralizing, debilitating and paralyzing effects upon the listener. For example, we find in the Book of Job, four friends with unguarded lips, nearly sinking the ship of Job's life which seems to have lost Gods favour. They have shot reproves and rebukes with condemning words, where strengthening grace could have been ministered. God's perspective was missing in their world view. In their imaginations, the excruciating pain and horrible calamities of Job were the curse of God. By trying to convince Job that he lost God's favour, they were in fact wounding and shattering his soul. Job becomes an imitable example for us by taking a different view point strengthened by a heightened spiritual awareness. "Then Jab answered and said, how long will you vex my soul? And break me in pieces with words?"

(Job 19:1-2).

Switching the perspective or commonly known as 'reframing' is an art. If one develops the capacity to go inside occasionally, ie., zoom in to see every detailed distortion and then zoom out far and wide to get a grip of the whole picture of reality from a higher perspective, we can save ourselves from much of the bullshit that sinks our ships. It's like switching on a 'common sense detector' from within the brain that alarms the sinking of the ship.





Whenever we think of St. Teresa of Avila, the normal and immediate thought that comes to our mind is of her enchanting figure, holding a quill-pen, glancing far above in a pensive mood. This sight still leads to spontaneous inquisitiveness especially in the lovers and admirers of St. Teresa of Avila. What must have been her appearance? In the book of her Life, at the introduction part, we find a fascinating yet detailed depiction on this by herself. She was of medium stature and not so thin; she had rosy cheeks and fair complexion. Her royal-broad forehead, thick eyebrows, black eyes and hair, along with the three tiny moles on her face supplemented her beauty. From this description it is understood that St. Teresa of Avila was indeed a beautiful and enchanting woman of her times. St. Teresa of Avila wrote four major works which have been highly influencing spiritual seekers of all the times without religious borders. The deep influence and high value of her writings are evidenced in the availability and presence of her writings in most of the libraries of the world. Her major works are: The Life, The Way of Perfection, The Interior Castle, and The Foundations.

When we read through the book of Life, we find that St. Teresa of Avila made two daring and courageous escapades in her real life. The first adventure was at the age of seven with her brother - Roderigo towards Africa where they might be beheaded by the infidel moors. However, this first escapade is foiled by her uncle who brought them back home, there naturally arises a curious question - what made them to do so? The answer to this we find in the book of Life (Chapter- 1:1): "To have had virtuous and God-fearing parents along with the graces the Lord granted".

The parents of St. Teresa of Avila were highly virtuous which resulted in her pious and virtuous upbringing. Added to this, she had access to a good number of inspiring books as her father was a ferocious reader. She writes, "My father was fond of reading good books, and thus he also had books in Spanish for his children to read." Teresa as a young girl, gradually became completely fascinated by the stories of the saints and martyrs. Those stories made her to have an ardent love to become a martyr for Christ although her taste of reading books switched from the stories of saints to that of romantic ones later. She writes, "when I considered the martyrdoms, the saints suffered for God, it seemed to me that the price they paid for going to enjoy God was very cheap, and I greatly desired to die in the same way. I did not want this on the account of the love of God but to get to enjoy very quickly the wonderful things I read there were in heaven." Thus, St. Teresa of Avila was highly driven by a great desire to enjoy heaven which epitomised in her first escapade. She was confident that the only means to heaven is martyrdom, which she tried to realise through her first adventurous escapade along with her little brother.

Empowering the Marginalized: An Undertaking of Carmelite Charitable Society



Carmelite Social Services (CSS), An undertaking of Carmelite Charitable Society, Reg. No. 337/1980-81 is headquartered at Hoshiarpur, Punjab, dedicated to rebuilding the lives of the mis-fortune and disadvantaged sections of the society. Propelled by the exhortation of Jesus Christ, "Whatever you did to the least of these brothers of mine, you did it to me" (Mathew 25:40), the Carmelite Missionaries are endeavouring to serve, uplift and transform the

marginalised sections of the society. Around three decades ago, visionaries planted the seeds of these humanitarian activities and ever since it has been steadily growing and achieving greater heights.

Today a team of efficient, far sighted and skilled management and a dedicated, well trained and dextrous staff, are working together to kindle the light of infinite possibilities in the lives of many, so that they may pursue and achieve their goals and dreams in life.

Slum Education Centres

Part of our Childhood-Enhancement Programme is ensuring educational excellence for the disadvantaged children, through the free tuition classes conducted in various centres. Though these centres had a humble beginning, it has brought laurels to the participants, making them out perform the classmates and achieving the envious first positions in their respective classes. Now the classes are flooded beyond its capacities and gradually carving a brighter future for the less fortunate children of the society.

Data: CSS have 17 Slum Education Centres and 4 Anganwadi Centres at different Slum areas of District Hoshiarpur.

Family Counselling

Our objectives are to offer regular counselling for those in dire needs of it - the socially impoverished, psychologically affected, morally weakened and those suffering from broken relationships etc. An expert team of well trained and academically qualified personal would be supporting those in need of family counselling, psychological integration and spiritual up-liftment. Having a shattered moment in relationship doesn't mean everything has come to an end, rather it's a sign that one needs some expert's help. Our family counselling team is well equipped to guide, support and rectify relations and enable the



couples to meet all challenges in their family life with ease. The experienced and well qualified psychologists and counsellors help to solve the issues related to separation, divorce etc affecting the parties and their children; mental health issues, addiction, obesity and so on. Data: CSS on 2 days of every moth conducts family counselling/student counselling at CSS' office, so far 25 families and 140 students are given counselling. Professional Counsellors are CSS' resource persons, namely: Rev. Fr. George Vayalil, Fr. Abraham Eranattu, Sr. Laisa Thomas and Mrs. Nalanda Saroya.

Home for the Homeless

Other than enabling people to address their own problems and uplift them from their multi-faceted social, economic and health issues, we also focus on those who are totally helpless and help to rehabilitate themselves under the safety and security of a thatched roof, called their own home. The deserved ones are chosen on priority basis without any distinction or discrimination of cast, religious or political affiliation or of their background.

Data: CSS have so far constructed/repaired 42 Houses at Punjab, Kerala and Himachal with the help of Carmelite Charitable Society and other Benefactors

Women Empowerment through SHG

We care about the growth and development of women in the communities we serve. Women being the backbone of the family and in an extended sense, the backbone of the society, it is of utmost importance that they be provided with necessary skills to be self-sufficient and entrepreneurial in this overly patriarchal society. Self-employment and economic freedom can bring the marginalised women to the forefront of the society. We facilitate them to go forward with the Governmental initiative of self-help groups.


A "Self Help Group" for women is a small volunteer association of disadvantaged, mostly from the similar socioeconomic background. An initial capital is given to start the enterprise. Further guidelines and directives are given to go forward, followed by supervision at each stage of growth, giving flesh and blood to their dreams and aspirations.



Technical Courses

We have education and skill development centres with an aim to provide secure knowledge and livelihood for the youth. Our mission in this area focuses on rebuilding the lives and helping the young people to become self-sufficient by learning a trade that will help them ensure employment. There are job oriented courses with nominal fees, offered at our computer centres, tuition centres, under the guidance of experts. These centres are equipped with best facilities.

Data: CSS have Computer Certificate Course at Mehtiana, Hoshiarpur. 300 Youth have passed out from Carmel Computer Centre.



These programmes aim at moulding the youth in to change-makers of the society. It focuses to help the youth, who are wandering, disengaged and are non-contributors to the society or to their family. Through Carmel Youth Club (CYC) seminars, counselling and career oriented programmes and reinstating them to their lost educational path, they are groomed and carved to be contributors and productive members to the society.

CSS have conducted 120 Youth Guidance & Carrier Building Programmes at different Colleges, Schools, Villages & Slum Areas.

Student Counselling

To address all the challenges faced by the students of this modern era from their multiple pressure centres, family and school and to enable them to have a brighter future, they will be availed educational experts and counsellors who will support, guide and direct them in the right path. The experts will help in the all-round development of the children especially to their academic excellence.



Data: CSS conducts Student Counselling on 1 st and 3rd Thursday of every month at CSS' Office.




MY BEST FRIEND



CONVERSION OF ST. PAUL

The feast of the conversion of St. Paul is also known as the Pauline conversion, Damascene conversion, Damascus Christophany and the road to Damascus event. This event eventually led him to cease persecuting early Christians and to become an extraordinary follower of Jesus according to the New Testament.

Paul's conversion is something we must rejoice over, proud off and be thankful to God. For with his conversion to the Christianity, his preaching the Good News of Jesus to the whole humanity and zealous travel is a big landmark, not only to Christianity but also to the whole humanity. That is the great significance of the conversion of St. Paul that we would still be ignorant about Jesus Christ, for his letters



constitute the half of the books of the New Testament. It is from there, we come to know more about Jesus and the early Church and most of our Catholic teachings come from the letters of St. Paul.

St. Paul was a man of great faith, a great missionary by his virtuous life. He himself said that he was from Tarsus in the province of Cilicia. He was born of Jewish parents and according to St. Jerome he was from Galilee belonging the tribe of Benjamin. On the occasion of his circumcision, he was given the name Saul and got an additional name Paul, as part of Roman citizenship.

He studied law from school of Gamaliel. As he was a learned man and was well versed in Aramaic & Greek. This proficiency was very useful for his missionary journeys.

St. Paul had a very good & compelling reason for making a U- turn in his life. A dramatic interruption happened to him on the way to Damascus. He was at first struck down & then was raised up. That was turning point for his conversion. Saul was led into Christian community, where he regained his sights & earned new insights that led him to discern his mission. Isn't this also an essential direction in the process of repentance? One is initiated into the Body of Christ and then begins, fulfilling one's responsibilities within it.

It is clear from what happened to this extraordinary Apostle that his transformation was not the result of long inner reflection nor even the fruit of personal effort. It was first and foremost a work of the grace of God who acted in His own inscrutable ways. St. Paul affirms of the gift of the Divine grace in 1 Cor 15:10

"by the grace of God I am what I am and his grace toward me was not in vain". The Damascus event is a single, solid, coherent scheme that formed the framework of his mature theology. It caused him to rethink from the ground of everything, he had ever believed in Judaism and who God really was.

The transforming effect of Paul's conversion influenced the clear antithesis that he saw between righteousness based on the law, which he had sought in his former life and the righteousness based on the death of Christ. The light of Christ blinded his external eyes but opened the inner sight to see the truth, the resurrected Jesus. So the conversion is to be struck by the love of God and get the inner eyes illumined.

His journey to Damascus signifies the true spiritual journey that produces the experience of all, who are set free from the illusion and fantasies that influence them to achieve their own authenticity. Paul knew that his transformation was not the result of an evolution in his thinking or personal reflections but rather the fruit of an invisible Divine grace. That transformed him from Murderer into Minister of the Christ.

His journey to Damascus signifies the true spiritual journey that produces the experience of all, who are set free from the illusion and fantasies that influence them to achieve their own authenticity.


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The road to Damascus is also a place of meeting with Jesus who approaches those who until that moment do not know Him and recognize Him. The same thing happened to those travelers to Emmaus. The circumstances are always the same. It is always Jesus who comes to meet, those who are preoccupied or incredulous like Paul. Hence, after such an encounter with the Divine grace our lives are bound to be transformed by it. There begins the mission, for those who really have met Christ and come into contact with Christ cannot keep Him for themselves. Think of Mother Mary's joyful journey to Elizabeth after the Divine Conception. Likewise, in our lives we are also reminded to ponder such experiences of Jesus. And begin our mission to share, to communicate the experience of love, af God's grace and Christ's joy that have been revealed to us with others.

Pope emeritus Benedict XVI once said "in fact, the Lord's call to Paul on the road to Damascus brought

him to this: to making Christ the Centre of his life, leaving all things for the sublimity of knowing Him and the mystery of His love, and subsequently, striving to proclaim him to all, especially the pagans, that we may spread his name".

May the feast of the conversion of this great pillar of Christianity, the converted Saul help us through his intercessions, to recognize God's action in our lives and to transform ourselves genuinely for the greater glory of Jesus.

One of the leading questions that is re-echoed repeatedly in everyone's meditative moment is nothing else than apropos the very meaning and mystery of his/er inner spiritual religious life. What will be my personal answer to this question will determine the quality of life and joy that I live and transmit to others. My religious vocation can only be understood as a visible sign of God's immense love and concern for me. In it, He has invited me to take part in His love and essence. In the book of Genesis, we read about this limitless love of God as He promises man a new world order (Gen. 9) though man had explicitly disobeyed Him. Remarkably, the other side of the essence of God's love is forgiveness and mercy. If we can reflect deeply, we shall encounter this same disloyalty from our personal side and God's redeeming intervention on the other side. In fact, the whole of NT is a tangible expression of God the father's immense and borderless love. In St. Luke, ch: 15 we get a close connection with the generous love of God the father, as picturised by Jesus in worlds most short and vibrant story of all timethe Parable of the Prodigal Son. In essence, God's immense love (Rom, 5:5) can be encountered in two ways. a. As in the case of Prodigal son: this model stands for those who are influential, capable and talented. Here the active initiative is from creatures. The prodigal son takes the initiative and the father rushes to meet him on his return, b. The second model pertains to those in case of the lost sheep (Lk. 15: 1-7). It represents those simple, uneducated and humble people. God is merciful and kind towards these as he searches for them until they are found and redeemed.

There are few signs which can be present in these categories of people who are intimate to God

- They easily recognize the presence of God in each and every moment of their life in various and manifold experiences of life. These are not like Mary Magdalene who could not recognize Jesus (Jn, 20: 15) easily although she was considered one of the favourite disciples of Jesus.
- They are people who react positively even to the negative experiences of their lives. In Mt. 5: 11 we read 'Blessed are you, when people insult you and persecute you and speak all kinds of evil against you because you are my followers. Be happy are glad, for a great reward is kept for you in heaven".
- 3. They totally trust and submit themselves to God. Often, we hear of people who spreads calumnies about others. One person who is not content and happy with himself will never be content and happy with others. Because they did not get what they want. On the other hand, one who is trusting in God surrenders aneself completely and expects everything from God. He resorts often to the providence and care of God, who is concerned even of the lilies of the field.
- 4. Fourthly, these types of people are those who sold everything to own the field where the precious pearl of the Kingdom (Mt, 13:44) could be found. They constantly ask to themselves this question like the rich young man in St. Lk 18: 18-30, what shall I do to possess eternal life? They are the sort of people who constantly ask themselves: what more shall I sell to own eternal life?
- 5. Lastly, the perfection of consecration is reached as one shows in his/er life responsibility, sensitivity and equanimity towards everything in this world in an attitude of Spiritual Motherhood. St. Therese of Lisieux explains this sort of motherhood in her The Story of a Soul after the conversion of Henri Pranzini, through her intercession: 'mon premier enfant"; this is my first Child.
